Turning the Curve has had a busy few months. In the last few months we have seen six new learners pass their restricted license tests and three pass their full license tests. Driving supports former refugees to gain independence and participate more fully in New Zealand life.

We are also busy starting a new set of drivers for our programme with lessons underway. As a result we are looking for some remarkable women willing to volunteer their time to take a refugee-background woman for driving practice. The learner drivers have had lessons with a driving school and need practice to prepare for their restricted or full licence test. The learner driver will provide the car for practice.

Comprehensive training and ongoing support will be given to volunteers. You'll make a positive difference to her life and her family's, receive training in new skills, increase your understanding of another culture and contribute to improving driver safety on the road.



# Masters Scholarship in Gender, Ethnicity and Politics

We invite applications from suitably qualified candidates to undertake a fees-paid Masters in the topic area of 'Ethnic Minority Young Women and Politics in Aoteaora New Zealand'. Ethnic here is defined as non-Māori, non-Pākeha, non-Pacifika population groups in New Zealand, and commonly refers to peoples coming from Asia, Africa, the Middle East, South and Latin America, and continental/Eastern Europe.

We intend to offer a ONE year fees scholarship to undertake a 120-point thesis as part of a Marsden Grant-funded research project entitled 'Double jeopardy or double advantage? Ethnic women in New Zealand politics' and will be undertaken at the School of Population Health, The Faculty of Medical and Health Sciences, The University of Auckland starting in March 2023.

## The Project: Background

Although ethnic minority women are increasingly visible actors within mainstream politics in western democracies, there is little scholarship focusing on their experiences. This dearth is especially evident in the context of Aotearoa/New Zealand. Like elsewhere in the Anglo-European world, ethnic women in New Zealand are integral to politics – e.g., as MPs, councillors, party members, and political candidates – yet, they are overlooked in academic research. This research seeks, at one level, to understand the experiences of ethnic women as politicians within New Zealand's political systems. Conceptually, however, their lived realities are a window to examining the complex intersections between gender, ethnicity, culture and politics in New Zealand's bicultural and multi-ethnic democracy, especially through the perspectives of the marginalised among minorities.

Uniquely 'about and by' ethnic women, this research draws on an analytical framework that focuses on aspects of representation, identity, discrimination and governance. This study is timely, contributing to emergent international scholarship on intersectionality and mainstream politics while also providing insights for practical consideration for current and prospective ethnic women politicians in NZ. The Masters student's project can develop a theme related to the main project or related to the topic of ethnicity, gender/young women and politics.

# **Candidate Qualification**

Applications are invited from suitably qualified candidates with a high motivation to contribute to an emerging area of ethnic feminist politics scholarship in New Zealand. Students with familiarity in feminist political theory, intersectionality scholarship, and New Zealand politics are especially welcomed to apply.

Students must have taken research methodology courses in their undergraduate or post-graduate study. Familiarity with and/or prior work experience in ethnic minority communities is an advantage.

Students must ideally have the capability and capacity for independent work while also contributing to a team of ethnic women scholars. Timely completion is vital to this project and we are particularly keen to invite students who have a track record of successfully managing deadlines. The successful candidate will also attend regular meetings with the team, which will include the Principal Investigator, Associate Investigator, Post-Doctoral Fellow, and Research Associates.

You may be asked to provide the following documents: (a) a cover letter outlining your interest in this project; (b) your curriculum vitae including the names and contact details of two referees; (c) a half-page statement of outlining a proposed topic you might do research on; (d) copies of academic transcripts; and (e) a sample of your writing, either published or part of previous course work.

# Amplifying Mokopuna Voice in the Curriculum Refresh

"As Aotearoa has evolved, the curriculum has remained the same. All ākonga (learners) need to see themselves reflected in the curriculum. We have recognised this, and it is time for change." - Curriculum Voices Group

The New Zealand Curriculum is being refreshed to better reflect the aspirations and expectations of Aotearoa, New Zealand. This refresh is taking place until 2025.

#### Kia kuru pounamu te rongo | All mokopuna live their best lives

The Children's Commissioner, Judge Francis Eivers (Ngāti Maniapoto, Waikato), advocates for the 1.2 million mokopuna in Aotearoa. Access to and participation in inclusive and equitable education for all mokopuna is a crucial priority for the Office of the Children's Commissioner. Together we will amplify, advocate and protect the voices of all mokopuna throughout this journey.

#### Use your voice to transform education:

The Office of the Children's Commissioner and the Ministry of Education have come together to ensure the voices of mokopuna are honoured. This partnership is a shared commitment to mokopuna being central to and visible in the future of education.

We are inviting **you** to nominate mokopuna for a Youth Voices Group that will champion *how* the voices of children and young people are heard across the country. They will do this by:

- Sharing their unique perspectives, insights and lived experiences.
- Developing their own ways of working and collective work programme.
- Deciding *how* to interact with and feedback to the other groups involved.
- Designing mokopuna engagement across the country.

The Youth Voices Group will bring together up to 30 young people from diverse communities and experiences.

#### Who are we looking for?

Mokopuna aged roughly between 15-17 from all walks of life. Within the wider Youth Voices Group, caucuses (smaller groups) will support safe and open discussion between people with shared experiences. This function is being developed in response to community feedback, and our commitment to ensuring genuine and inclusive participation. The caucuses will evolve and grow to meet the needs of the group, beginning with:

- Tangata Whenua Caucus: Mokopuna who whakapapa Māori.
- Pasifika Caucus: Mokopuna who descend from the Pacific nations.
- Resettled Caucus: Mokopuna with refugee, asylum or new migrant experience.
- Disabled Caucus: Mokopuna with lived experience of disability.

#### Make a nomination for the Youth Voices Groups:

It truly does take a village, and we will not ask any mokopuna to participate without ensuring they are fully supported throughout this kaupapa. While we will provide safe, positive, and meaningful experiences, the true magic comes from honouring trusted relationships young people already have within their communities.

We are asking schools, kura, communities, hapū, iwi and organisations who work with mokopuna across the education spectrum to make nominations for the Youth Voices Group. By making a nomination, you are also committing to support the nominated mokopuna throughout their journey in the Youth Voices Group. This is an unpaid responsibility for the support people, but we will cover your expenses and be respectful of your time. We want to build lasting relationships beyond this kaupapa, and we look forward to getting to know you and your community through this work.

#### Selecting the Youth Voices Groups from nominations:

A bespoke Selection Panel will ensure a comprehensive representation of communities and backgrounds in the Youth Voices Group. Selections will be made using an equity approach to be inclusive of ethnically diverse, rainbow, rural and care-experienced mokopuna, especially those who are currently underserved by the education system and who are not often represented in other youth advisory groups.

#### What is the workload?

The Youth Voices Group will meet 8 times during 2023 as a collective, or in caucus. The Youth Voices Group will collectively determine their work program, when and how they will meet, and communicate throughout the year. The first and last hui will be held over two days in the capital to open and close the kaupapa for the year, and to determine the path into 2024.

We will keep the process flexible and inclusive. Still, we understand that things change and will support mokopuna through the process if they choose to step away. This could involve a replacement from the same community or the selection of another nominee.

#### Honouring your contribution:

The selected Youth Voices Group members will receive \$200 for each of the 8 meetings in 2023. All expenses will be paid for by the Office of the Children's Commissioner and the Ministry of Education. This includes travel, accommodation, food, and resources for all selected nominees to participate fully and freely.

All mokopuna have different pathways to navigate, and we are committed to removing barriers along the way. We will work with the support person or organisation who nominated the mokopuna to overcome any challenges.
